Ultrafragola is a highly evocative item. Powerful in its name, thanks to the force of the prefix "Ultra". Sensual, thanks to its characteristic intense pink colour, its shape that is a tribute to the female figure, with insistent repetition of soft curves that seem to expand infinitely. Designed by Ettore Sottsass jr. in 1970, as part of the Mobili Grigi project, Ultrafragola is the only piece of that series that Poltronova has continued producing without a break from 1970 to now. In the year it was designed, Ultrafragola was the protagonist of an iconic shooting presentation, today its magnetism is so strong that one cannot help taking a picture of oneself framed in its luminous waves.






made in Italy since 1970

Each Ultrafragola piece ever produced has been thermoformed from the single original aluminium mould of 1970. Ultrafragola consists of a mirror and a thermoformed translucent plastic frame which emits a pink light. Mounting and all the plastic components are finished by hand at the company, and it's also arranged to be hung on the wall if needed. The back panel is made of fireproof forex. Also, a unique numerical code, printed at the company onto the back of the item,

certifies its authenticity and its being made in Italy.









Poltronova factory, Agliana. 1970—2020
